

Nowhere Fast is a novel about power and powerlessness in our closest relationships. Through a microcosm of volunteer work for the marching band, dinners and everyday moments, the novel shows how we live in the tension between duty and care, defence and guilt, while the big things rage around us.

Helga Flatland

Helga Flatland (b. 1984) is one of Norway's most awarded and widely read authors. Her debut *Stay If You Can. Leave If You Must* (2010) received excellent reviews, brought her the Tarjei Vesaas First Book Prize and established her as one of the foremost up-and-coming Norwegian Authors. She had a massive breakthrough with a broader audience with the Booksellers' Prize-winning novel *A Modern Family* (2017). Within weeks of publication the novel had sold 20,000 copies. Flatland's novels have been translated into 15 languages.




Per Petterson (b. 1952, Oslo) has written nine acclaimed, bestselling novels and stands among the most internationally celebrated authors to emerge from Scandinavia in recent decades.

He made his debut with the short story collection *Ashes in My Mouth, Sand in My Shoes* in 1987. Petterson's major international breakthrough came with the novel *Out Stealing Horses*, which won the International IMPAC Dublin Literary Award and ended up as one of the 10 best books of the year in the New York Times. His latest novel, *Men in My Situation*, was nominated for both the Critics' Prize, the Booksellers' Prize and the NRK Listeners' Prize. Petterson's books have been translated into over 50 languages.


A Worker's Heart 2 expands and continues the story of Trond: a middle-aged man from Namsos who no longer recognises himself or the country he comes from. It is the story of a fall, and of a possible way back.

Trond tries to get his life back on track. He looks for a new job, tries to repair his relationship with his wife, and his daughter has fallen ill. At the same time, he looks back he tries to understand himself and the society he is part of, he tries to find his own story.

A Worker's Heart is an impressive, riveting novel about class and an authentic and deeply humanistic story about community in all its forms – family, social, political, national. It's about a community that is falling apart, but also about what it takes to rebuild it.


Carl Frode Tiller

One of his generation's most important novelists, Carl Frode Tiller (b. 1970) is admired for his instantly recognizable, furious prose and his ability to create vivid, complex characters. His first novel, The Slope (2001) won both the Vesaas Debut Prize and the P2 Listeners' Novel Prize. His works include the Encirclement trilogy (2007-2014) and the acclaimed novel Flight (2021). He has won prizes such as the Brage Prize, the Critics' Prize, the EU Prize of Literature and the Hunger Prize.

Where Are the Grown-Ups?





Ida, a sixty-year-old relationship therapist, has lost her mother, with whom she had a troubled relationship, to say the least. But things are better now. In death, her mother has taken her place in Ida's chest, not in her heart, but somewhere behind her collarbone. There she lies, rocking gently, saying little, just watching what is happening, a low, calm voice in her ear.

Sigurd, Ida's adult son, has broken with his mother for reasons he has chosen to keep to himself. Harald, her second husband, has also left her. But life goes on anyway, the clients continue to come, and with them the spirit of the times, which Ida feels increasingly alien to. And now Sigurd suddenly wants to get back in touch.



Nina Lykke (b. 1965) made her debut in 2010 with the critically acclaimed short story collection *The Orgy, and Other Stories*. Her big breakthrough came with her second novel *No, a Hundred Times No* (2016), which won the Young Critics' Prize. For *Natural Causes*, Lykke received the Brage Prize in 2019. In 2022, Lykke's fifth book, *We're Not Here to Have Fun*, was published, finding great success both among critics and readers. Lykke's books have been translated into 19 languages.


'I have inherited your hands. Although mine are slimmer, it is easy to see traces of yours in mine. For many years, I found that uncomfortable.'

Stranger is a novel about an adult son who is not done investigating who his father was and how he became the person he is. A son who loved his father, but also feared him throughout his childhood, and most of all: feared becoming like him.

It is about growing up in the shadow of mental illness. About wanting to break free and sail to the other side of the world, only to be dragged back again to the challenges of your childhood home. How do you move on when you are both bound to those you love and at the same time want to distance yourself?



Simon Stranger (b. 1976) made his debut in 2003, and has since written books for children, young adults and adults. His 2018 novel *Keep Saying Their Names* won the Booksellers' Prize and has been an international success, with rights sold in 25 territories.



A day like any other in Oslo around the year 2000: Washing in water from a bucket in winter. Stealing electricity from the neighbour with an extension cord threaded through a hole in the outer wall. Getting high with your parents. Being thrown out of your childhood home, trudging the streets in the cold, always dirty, constantly looking for a place to sleep.

Streets I Have Lived is a story about the shame of lacking the basics and at the same time sticking together out of fierce family loyalty. Nikolai Torgersen wisely reflects on hereditary poverty, exclusion and illness in a language that is as energetic and bouncy as it is eloquent. It's about what it's actually like to learn to swim on your own, and about a creative urge that makes it possible to break out of a hellish existence.


Nikolai Torgersen

On the Nature of Things




The narrator of *On the Nature of Things* lives on the breadline. The electricity is cut off in the dilapidated house she rents on the edge of the forest, mice scurry across the attic floor, and the water in the pipes is brown. To make ends meet, she cleans other people's houses, locks herself into empty flats, and polishes surfaces.

Now she has agreed to write an essay for a magazine, a special issue on literary spaces. But she can't get started. Her body stiffens from all the cleaning, becomes alien to her. She thinks about places she has lived, at her grandmother's in Bergen, a commune in Berlin, she thinks about homelessness, which has become a habit, packing her few belongings and moving on. And she thinks about an old love, trying to dissect the memory of it.

On the Nature of Things is a novel about homelessness in many forms. Merethe Lindstrøm's prose is unlike any other, precisely piercing, raw and beautiful, and permeated by a subtle humour.

Merethe Lindstrøm

Merethe Lindstrøm (born 1963)made her debut in 1983 with a collection of short stories, and has since published 11 novels, 7 volumes of short stories and a children's book. From early on, Lindstrøm was regarded by many as one of Norway's finest short story writers after Kjell Askildsen, culminating in the collection *The Guests*, which was nominated for both the Nordic Council Literature Prize. Her breakthrough with a larger audience, came with the novel *Days in the History of Silence* (2011), which won both the Nordic Council Literature Prize and the Critics' Prize.





With the publication of the novel *Cut* in 1994, Hanne Ørstavik (b. 1969) embarked on a career that would make her one of the most remarkable and admired authors in Norwegian contemporary literature. Her literary breakthrough came with *Love* (2006), which has been published in more than 30 languages. Since then the author has written several acclaimed and much discussed novels and received a host of literary prizes.





She Is Alive - Elise's Book



Kjersti Skomsvold never knew much about her great-grandmother, Elise, except this: People were afraid of her. And she must have had a hard life.

But when life starts taking its toll, Kjersti lies awake at night. She starts imagining Elise, who was born in 1880. Most of it is fiction. but some of it is true: at twelve, Elise loses her father. Far too young, she begins a relationship with her teacher, and when she gets pregnant at the age of 17, they get married. In the years that follow, she gives birth to child after child after child, and she has to bury many of them. But even though Elise is remembered as an angry and bitter woman, she must have loved life at one time, right?

It's the mid-1970s, and Filip is part of a closeknit gang of boys in southern Oslo. Bound by a strict code of honour, where a boy is a boy and a word is a word, they have their heyday, right in the transition between childhood and adolescence. Unspoken but unbreakable agreements are made based on principles of justice and loyalty, and what happens on the way to school and out in the forest is nobody else's business. Later in life, the five of them will lose touch, and perhaps their principles will also fall by the wayside. But where the box with the vital little things is buried that's something they won't forget.

We Must Remember This is a novel about friendship, discovery and discovering your true strenght, characterised by exuberant storytelling and vivid prose.



Lars Elling





Dag Johan Haugerud

Pastoral Care



He is a deacon who works in a church in Oslo, providing pastoral care to members of the congregation: emotional and spiritual support when life gets rough. He never believed in God, but he chose this profession because he wants to be a fellow human being, and because it gives him the opportunity to meet people in everyday life.

Through an acquaintance, he meets a man whom he is both attracted to and slightly repelled by. The conversation between them takes a turn he does not like, away from the everyday and into the existential. Initially, he wanted to have sex with the man, perhaps even develop a relationship, but now that the conversation has taken on the character of pastoral care, he feels as if he is in danger of exploiting his role as a deacon and thus violating professional ethics.

Pastoral Care is a seemingly quiet yet intensely penetrating novel that raises questions about faith and how desire and attraction should be balanced against the need to take responsibility and care for others.

Dag Johan Haugerud (b. 1964) made his literary debut in 1999 with the warmly received novel *Something with Nature. Easy Atonal Pieces for Children*, his fourth novel, was met with brilliant reviews and won the P2 Listeners' Novel Prize.





Beastly





Are there more ways to lose your head during cross-country ski marathon? Fishermen often catch fish on their hooks, but what happens when you pull a woman out of the depths? Who said that riding camps are a good arena for young girls' sexual awakening?

In the ten stories in *Beastly*, humans, animals and the beast that lives inside us all collide. And in the collision, a little bit of everything happens, including unthinkable transgressions, absurd situations and burlesque humour.

Ellen Støkken Dahl

Ellen Støkken Dahl (b. 1991) is a writer and a doctor. Together with Nina Brochmann, she has written several award-winning books, including *The Wonder Down under* (2017), which has been translated into 36 languages, and the puberty guides *The Girl Book* (2019) and *The Boy Book* (2021). Their TEDx talk "The Virginity Fraud", about the myths surrounding the hymen, has been viewed over 11 million times.

Dahl's first book as a solo writer was *Sleeping with the Enemy* (2023), a popular science book about sexually transmitted diseases. *Beastly* is her first fiction book.

A Girl Child



Danish (Lindhardt & Ringhof - pre-empt), French (Actes Sud), German (btb), Hungarian (Polar)

The year is 1814, and Aslak Broch has just turned eighteen when representatives from the army come to the farm and demand that he report for duty. His parents oppose their son's desire to go. They have sacrificed too much to let him die fighting for a Danish king.

Aslak has been waiting for such an opportunity all his life. He defies his parents, and for the first time he gets to know boys his own age. At home on the farm, his parents have to deal with the fear that their son will die.

A Girl Child is the story of the brotherhood between three young men at war, and two parents who are left alone with the guilt of the sin they committed to keep their son alive.

Kathrin Pabst's ancestors were living in Pomerania when, in the winter months of 1945, the Red Army advanced and pushed millions of German civilians out of the areas that would now fall to Poland. Throughout a long year on the run, the great-grandparents kept a diary describing the cold, hunger and disease, forced labor and systematic rape. But none of this was ever talked about in the family.

At the same time, their son, Kathrin's grandfather, was a Wehrmacht soldier in one of Hitler's elite troops. He too wrote a diary, but it does not mention acts of war in which he probably participated, and he never talked about them. Later in life, he would build a house with a bunker in the basement. Why would he do that? And how could he, who was so loving, fail to distance himself from Nazism and the crimes his own regiment must have committed?

Kathrin Pabst's personal story shows how traumatic events can leave their mark on several generations, and why it is so important to talk about even the painful memories.

Kathrin Pabst was born in Gummersbach in Germany and moved to Norway in 2001. She has a PhD in ethics and has many years of experience working with difficult and tabooed stories.



Torborg Nedreaas (1906-1987) was one of the most outstanding writers of the post-war era in Norway. Among her great works are the novel Nothing Grows by Moonlight (1947), and a coming-of-age trilogy consisting of The Magic Glass (1950), Music from a Blue Well (1960) and At the Next New Moon (1971). She won the first ever Norwegian Critics' Prize for The Magic Glass in 1951 and also won the Dobloug Prize and the Norwegian Academy's Prize. In 2023 Nothing Grows by Moonlight was selected as one of 10 books in the newspaper Klassekampen's Canon of the Left, alongside monumental works by Marx and Engels, de Beauvoir, Steinbeck and Bourdieu.





In Renberg's captivating novel, readers are immersed in the story from the perspectives of a diverse cast of characters: from the attorney who champions Anna's defense, to the cook who discovers the lifeless infant, to the executioner who subjects Anna to torment, and, of course, Anna herself. *The Lung Float Test* is a riveting narrative that showcases the tension between archaic beliefs and burgeoning enlightenment, all set against the rich, dramatic backdrop of the baroque era. The story is based on a real case, which is considered the beginning of forensic medicine.
