


A Journey through Techno and Berlin Club Culture







Douwe Draaisma is a Dutch psychologist, university professor and the author of many books on human memory. His best-known book, on autobiographical memory, is *Why Life Speeds Up As You Get Older* (2001).


Mystery Cults in Ancient Greece and Rome

The Secret Sacred explores the hidden religious practices of the classical world. These cults, shrouded in secrecy, promised initiates a transformative afterlife. While many rituals remain mysterious, artworks and historical texts provide glimpses of their underlying beliefs.

The book examines Greco-Roman religious traditions and their divergence into mystery cults, including Bacchic ceremonies depicted in frescoes, Orphic gold tablets guiding souls in the underworld and the Eleusinian Mysteries celebrating Demeter and Persephone's cycle of rebirth. Eastern deities like Mithras, Isis and Cybele also feature in the cults discussed. The possible influence of mystery religions on early Christianity is also explored, drawing parallels with modern-day beliefs. Featuring the most recent archaeological discoveries and stunning museum artefacts, this is a lively account of the concealed faiths of the ancient world.



The vast expanse, unknown depths, dangers and mysteries of the sea have led mariners to create fantastical stories of ghosts and monsters for centuries; it is a world strange and 'other' to the experience of land dwellers. This body of lore has served to bond nautical communities together around the world and throughout history, with international stories fusing with local tales. *The Perilous Deep* explores why these stories were told, how they were repeated and mutated and what fears, anxieties and desires they helped to express. This is a fascinating exploration of the supernatural history of the Atlantic Ocean and some of its neighbouring seas, showing how seafaring peoples have developed knowledge and a sense of control over nature through myths and legends.


A Biography of Kim Il Sung Michael J. Seth

Kim Il Sung ruled his country, North Korea, for longer and shaped it more profoundly than almost any other modern leader. Yet he remains a curiously inaccessible, little understood person, partly due to the closed and secretive nature of the state he founded.

Michael J. Seth puts together what we know of Kim's life from all available sources and places it in the context of Korean and modern world history to make both Kim and North Korea comprehensible. He looks at the unusual circumstances that contributed to Kim's rise to power, and at the early experiences that help to explain the directions in which took his country. Seth examines his impressive early achievements and his later failures, which left North Korea the isolated, impoverished half of a divided nation.

Kim was a charismatic and resourceful leader determined to reunify and modernize his country. But he pursued these aims with ruthlessness, egotism and extreme narrow-mindedness. Ultimately, his political inflexibility led to disaster.

Michael J. Seth is a historian at James Madison University and one of the foremost experts on the history of Korea. His many books include *Korea: A Very Short Introduction* and *Korea at War.*



This biography explores the life and work of Katherine Mansfield, one of literary modernism's most significant writers. On the fringes of Bloomsbury, and friends with D. H. Lawrence, Aldous Huxley, T. S. Eliot and many others, Mansfield was at the heart of literary London at its most experimental. By the time of her death in 1923, aged just 34, she had broken boundaries and created new ways of writing that led her literary sparring partner Virginia Woolf to later admit that Mansfield's 'was the only writing I was ever jealous of'. Based on compelling new research, Gerri Kimber challenges previous conceptions surrounding the author's life, uncovers friendships and relationships formerly barely acknowledged and offers innovative readings of Mansfield's most celebrated stories.

Gerri Kimber is Visiting Professor in the Department of English at the University of Northampton. She was president of the Katherine Mansfield Society for ten years (2010–20) and has published extensively on Mansfield's life and work.


The History of Sake

Eric C. Rath

Sake, Japan's iconic rice-based alcoholic drink, has been central to Japanese culture for over 1,300 years. Traditionally made with rice, water and kōji mould, it was consumed in early brewpubs and was vital to samurai rituals and festivals. Sake's story includes homebrewers like clan matriarchs, ancient princes and modern political activists who defied laws to keep homebrewing alive. Temples refined sake-making techniques, laying the foundation for a thriving industry that became a major economic force for shoguns and the modern state.

Kanpai is the first history of sake in English, exploring its evolution from homebrew to flavoured varieties, its cultural significance and its global rise, including its growing popularity and production in North America and Europe. The book also shows how sake has shaped Japanese food, society and traditions.

Eric C. Rath is Professor of History at the University of Kansas. His books include *Oishii: The History of Sushi* (Reaktion Books, 2021).



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

Before Chanel, Dior or Saint Laurent, there was Paul Poiret. Born in Paris in 1879, he was the most audacious couturier of the pre-war era. While his outré styles were worn by famous celebrities in Europe and America, they were in fact the most fleeting facet of his work. Mary Davis explores how Poiret's genius was to place fashion at the centre of a network of style, culture and commerce. He founded groundbreaking perfume and interior design businesses, sponsored musical performances, amassed a modernist art collection and threw fantastical – and newsworthy – balls. Poiret's businesses faded by the end of the 1920s, but as this book reveals, his unifying vision set the model for the luxury industry as we know it.


A Parasite's History of Us

Parasites and parasitic relationships are fundamental to life on Earth and to human history. *Our Bodies, Our Planet* explores just how vital they are. Unlike harmful pathogens, parasites may produce no ill effects and may even improve our wellbeing and the lives of the creatures that surround us. Marcus Hall shows how our fellow travellers have evolved to help keep us alive, else they themselves will perish.

Parasitism is a phenomenon of partnership, and the association of parasite and host has had farranging cultural, biological and possibly geophysical consequences. From *Ascaris* to Zika, we are instinctively repulsed by these little freeloaders, but what collateral effects do they have on our lives, lifestyles and imaginations? As Hall demonstrates, we disregard our parasites at our peril.

Marcus Hall is Professor of Environmental History at the University of Zurich. His books include *Earth Repair* (2005), *Restoration and History* (2009) and *Mosquitopia* (with Dan Tamïr, 2021).

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

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

In today's 'experience society', everything is judged by personal experience, from online shopping to funerals. Value is measured by how satisfying an individual finds their experience, and the experience economy thrives on this desire for entertainment and fulfilment. Yet debates often reach an impasse when reduced to subjective feelings – whether offence is taken or criticisms are dismissed. Svend Brinkmann explores this cultural shift, examining how our reliance on subjective experience limits meaningful discussions and social cohesion. He argues for reclaiming a shared, objective reality, essential for tackling the major issues of our time, and for fostering genuine understanding beyond personal perceptions.

Svend Brinkmann is Professor of Psychology at Aalborg University, Denmark. He is the author of many bestselling books on philosophy and psychology, including *Think: In Defence of a Thoughtful Life* (2024).



Jacobitism, the cause championed by the exiled Stuart royal house, endured from the Revolution of 1688–91 until 1807, fuelled by plots, propaganda and uprisings – especially in Scotland. As the movement shifted from exiled courts in France and Italy to a wider diaspora, Jacobites spread across Europe, the Americas, Africa and Asia. From soldiers in European armies to settlers in British American colonies, Jacobites left a global impact: aiding Native American resistance yet also engaging in the enslavement of Black Africans. Their experiences abroad influenced European Enlightenment and Romanticism. This book offers a critical yet sympathetic view of Jacobitism, revealing its complex legacy across the world.

Allan I. Macinnes is Emeritus Professor of History, University of Strathclyde, and Honorary Professor in Irish and Scottish Studies, University of Aberdeen. His books include *A History of Scotland* (2018).



Radical Religious Women of the Seventeenth Century
Naomi Baker

Voices of Thunder illuminates the stories and beliefs of a dozen seventeenth-century radical Protestant women, including a Colchester woman who feared that her four children would starve to death and a former maidservant from Yorkshire who was granted an audience with the sultan of the Ottoman Empire. Their belief in spiritual equality empowered them to resist the status quo, questioning the authority of those who sought to lord it over them. From mostly humble backgrounds, they found ways to make their voices heard, creating some of the earliest autobiographical accounts in English and allowing us a rare and precious glimpse of the lives and experiences of women in the early modern era.

Naomi Baker is Senior Lecturer in English Literature at the University of Manchester. She has published widely on early modern women's writing, as well as early modern literature, drama and culture, including *Plain Ugly: The Unattractive Body in Early Modern Culture* (2010).

Winter Dreams


A Historical Guide to Old Age

Barbara H. Rosenwein

Winter Dreams is an evocative history of the ways the old have thought, felt and expressed themselves over two millennia, tracking the experience of ageing through artistic, literary and historical records. While old age is often depicted as 'sans teeth, sans eyes, sans everything', Barbara Rosenwein shows that the elderly have always retained their emotional depth and desires. She explores how these have changed over time, as societies' views of the elderly and of a 'good' old age have changed. And through careful exegesis, she allows the elderly, so often absent from the historical record, to speak to us.

We live in a rapidly ageing society, yet ageism is rampant and death and dying are taboo subjects. Rosenwein's book is a finely wrought testimony to the value of ageing and the richness of our winter dreams.

Barbara H. Rosenwein is a pioneering historian whose books explore the many ways in which different groups have experienced, valued and expressed emotions over time. She is Professor Emerita at Loyola University Chicago.



The First Imperator
Dexter Hoyos

Scipio Africanus (235–183 BC) commanded his first army at 25, led a daring invasion of Africa to personally defeat Hannibal and secured Rome's dominance over the Mediterranean. In ten years of command he never lost a battle, employing bold strategies to triumph over six enemy generals. Charismatic, ruthless and self-confident almost to the point of arrogance, Scipio was the first Roman leader hailed as Imperator, 'victorious commander', a title later adopted by emperors. He drove Carthage's forces from Spain and annexed its territories, and later imposed terms on Antiochus III, extending Rome's reach eastward; yet political jealousy at home led to his bitter exile. This biography explores the fortunes, fame and fate of a leader who outshone Caesar in military genius.

Dexter Hoyos is Honorary Associate Professor at Sydney University, Australia. His books include *Rome Victorious:* The Irresistible Rise of the Roman Empire (2019).



A radical history of England, *Contested Commons* is a gripping overview of increasingly restrictive policing and legislation against protest in public spaces. It tells the long history of contests over Trafalgar Square, Hyde Park, Cable Street and Kinder Scout, as well as sites in towns and rural areas across the country. Navickas reveals how protesters claimed these spaces as their own commons, resisting their continuing enclosure and exclusion by social and political elites. She investigates famous and less well-known demonstrations and protest marches, from early democracy, trade union movements and the Suffragettes to anti-fascist, Black rights and environmental campaigners in more recent times. *Contested Commons* offers positive as well as troubling lessons on how we protect the right to protest.

Katrina Navickas is Professor of History at the University of Hertfordshire. She is the author of *Protest and the Politics of Space and Place*, 1789–1848 (2016) and *Loyalism and Radicalism in Lancashire*, 1798–1815 (2009).



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



Gaston Bachelard

This is the first English biography of Gaston Bachelard, a philosopher who bridged the worlds of science and imagination.
