From 1986, he worked as a training instructor for war surgeons at various locations, including on behalf of the Red Cross and the WHO, as Chief Medical Officer of the UN mission in Africa and as Medical Advisor to the Secretary General for the UN Peacekeeping Operation in New York. From 1996 to 2009, as a doctor for Swiss Humanitarian Aid, he was also responsible for the international dossiers on mine action (Ottawa Convention) and bioterrorism.



There is plenty of reading about climate change, but two types dominate the genre: one that dramatically warns of the apocalypse, and one that seeks to expose alarmism as a Trojan horse of political forces. Both ignore the essentials: On the one hand, science has convincingly demonstrated that there is a climate problem; on the other, it is in fact being exploited politically. So instead of falling into one of the two categories, this book tells the story of how the niche subject of meteorology became the defining topic of our time. This is by no means only because global warming brings with it manifest risks, but also because science is misused as a vehicle for power, influence and money.

Woke Psychology of a culture war

Psychologist Esther Bockwyt analyzes that what was once thought of as progressive left-wing identity politics has long since crossed the threshold into a militant ideology. A generalized division of people into victim groups and privileged groups is used to determine who is allowed to say or do what and when. As critical as she is balanced and, above all, far removed from the shrill tones of the feature pages, Bockwyt captures the topic of wokeness from a psychological perspective for the first time and asks: How is a "woke psyche" composed when narcissism, conscientiousness or aggression exceed a healthy level?
